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DEEPENING ENGAGEMENT IN A BARE-MINIMUM WORLD

ABSTRACT:

The national emerging trend in student attitudes is toward a bare minimum, with college degrees valued as products, above the actual experience of learning. The institutional response arising from this affects our ability to offer deeply engaged experiential and community work at all levels. This presentation examines current research within the trend, and shares challenges and opportunities from a general studies decade-long experiment at an R-1 institute. Together, we will consider how we might adapt in this dissonance to build resilience to include more varied models and opportunities for engagement, especially for more diverse student populations in core and lower-level courses.
